## Healthcare regulatory news

CMS finalized three annual payment rules for physicians, hospital outpatient and ambulatory surgical centers, and home healthcare; as part of these updates, CMS reduced physician payments by an average 2.9% and increased Medicare home health payments by 0.5% for 2025... On Tuesday, a group of bipartisan House members introduced a bill that would increase physician pay by 4.73%, more than offsetting the fee schedule cut.

HHS OIG <u>found</u> Medicare Advantage plans received an additional \$7.5B in risk-adjusted payments from CMS by leveraging home visits and medical chart reviews to diagnose patients with conditions that do not exist, a practice known as upcoding.

HHS, along with its counterparts in Canada and Mexico, released the North American Preparedness for Animal and Human Pandemics Initiative, which aims to strengthen regional health security by promoting a OneHealth framework and building on lessons learned during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Medicare Shared Savings Program (MSSP) generated \$2.1B in savings for the Medicare program in 2023, and ACOs within the program earned \$3.1B in performance payments, according to CMS.

CMS <u>postponed</u> the Increasing Organ Transplant Access Model, a six-year mandatory initiative aimed at enhancing access to kidneys, beyond its anticipated start date of January 1, 2025... The delay amidst the government attempts to <u>overhaul</u> the organ transplant system, with over <u>100,000 individuals</u> awaiting an organ transplant.





# Healthcare law and policy news

Sen. Elizabeth Warren (D-Mass) <u>urged</u> the FTC to evaluate drug wholesalers McKesson and Cardinal Health's acquisitions of oncology practices, adding to the growing trend of <u>vertically</u> <u>integrated healthcare entities</u>.

According to KFF, Medicaid enrollment is expected to decline by 4% in FY 2025 while state Medicaid spending is projected to increase by 7% ... The projected decline in enrollment is driven by ongoing effects from the unwinding of continuous enrollment provision following the end of the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency.

GlaxoSmithKline has <u>acquired</u> CMG1A46, an experimental T-cell engager immunotherapy, for \$300M and will investigate its potential to treat lupus and certain types of blood cancers...

Preliminary studies suggest <u>immunotherapy treatments</u> could

potentially alleviate symptoms of hard-to-treat autoimmune disorders.
